Bing cherries. Love them. I wait impatiently every summer for the appearance of really good Bing cherries in the grocery, and not the light red ones, the dark, purply rich sweet goodness that looks like a glass of merlot on a stem.

My grandparents had cherry trees in their yard, 8 dwarf cherry trees, sour cherry trees. Dadpop had traveled all the way from Pennsylvania to Virginia to get the seedlings and plant them behind the house. Every summer they would bear thousands of bright blood-red cherries that made you pucker just to taste them. And we loved them. We ate as many as we picked, and they were oh, so good for Grandmom's baked cherry pudding (a coffee cake kind of confection). Neighbors up and



down the road would come and get them by the quart, and the birds liked them too, as evidenced by the decorations they left on house, porch, and cars. We would pick dozens of baskets full, and some would get used immediately, and some would be seeded and packaged for the freezer, to have cherry pudding all year long.

I have wonderful memories of sitting in the side yard with one of my grandmother's bibs around my neck — she made them out of tea towel-sized linen — and seeding cherries until my fingers were stained, the quart bags were full, my belly was full, and an emergency dash for the bathroom was inevitable. The flavor was so rich. On a recent jaunt to a kitchen gadget store, I found a cherry pitter. It is such a nifty tool! You place the cherry in the base, and when you squeeze the handle, a small ramrod with teeth shoots through the cherry and voila! — a pitted cherry falls into your bowl. Miraculous! I do wonder if Grandmom would appreciate this gadget, or if she would go on pitting her cherries in the usual way, getting satisfaction out of sitting outside in God's beautiful world, enjoying the shade and conversations with grandchildren who ate more fruit than they saved.

Conversations spring up all the time with folks about tradition vs. modernizing the church, and it seems that people like to be, and force others to be, in one camp or the other. Especially about music. But the Church and our worship are anchored on a much more stable foundation: the Gospel of Jesus Christ, our eternal King. Jesus said, "Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the Kingdom of Heaven is like a master of a house, who brings out of His treasure what is new and what is old." (Matthew 13:52).

People may treasure what is new, or what is old. Yet however we worship, traditional or modern, we preserve and pass on the ancient faith entrusted to us. Praise, prayer, confession, absolutions, hearing Scripture, the Word being faithfully preached, and responding to God through offerings, baptism, and communion, are the constant elements of worship that keep us tethered to our God. And although God's truth never changes, how we worship will meet the needs of many, and how others express worship in celebrating eternal truths will reach others. It's not about choosing one or the other, traditional or modern, it's about always choosing to worship. One way or the other, the fruit will always taste wonderful.
